Victoria Serves up VIP Welcome for ex-SAS Amputee's 10,000km Charity Ride to Support Injured Veterans

One-legged Vietnam veteran Laurie 'Truck' Sams SC has arrived in Melbourne on the final stages of an epic six-month, 10,000km bike ride from Hanoi to Sydney to raise awareness of veteran suicide and post-traumatic stress disorder.

Since crossing the border from South Australia a week ago the 67-year-old former Special Air Service warrant officer and his support team have been welcomed by a range of RSL and council-organised events that will continue to the New South Wales border and beyond.

"The response is amazing. Everyone seems to be aware of the damage PTSD is inflicting on our troops and veterans, and they're coming out in droves to wish me well," he said on his arrival in Melbourne from Rye.

Truck lost his left leg below the knee in a parachute accident in 1995 and suffers PTSD as a result of his experiences in five-man, deep penetration SAS patrols at the height of the Vietnam War. He was awarded a Star of Courage for saving the life of his student parachutist in the accident that cost him his left leg.

RSL sub-branches, town councils and businesses at Nhill, Horsham, Ararat, Ballarat, Melton, Queenscliff, Sorrento, Rye, Portsea, Rosebud, Seymour, Euroa, Violet Town, Benalla, Wangaratta and Wodonga have run or are planning welcome events ranging from wreath layings and memorial flower plantings to museum visits, musical presentations and barbecues.

"The Cup has taken over the city this weekend so I'm taking the chance to have a good rest and get some physio going on my good leg, and perhaps having a flutter on Our Ivanhowe, given I stayed overnight in Ivanhoe here in Melbourne with friends who are kindly supporting the ride."

Truck was officially welcomed to Melbourne by Mr Hong Lim MP, representing Victorian Veteran Affairs Minister John Eren, and RSL State Executive member and fellow Vietnam veteran Lee Webb, himself a keen cyclist.

Truck and his trusty Trek bike have logged 111 days and more than 9500km of riding since leaving Hanoi on May 12 carrying an Australian flag he wants to hand to the Prime Minister when he passes through Canberra on Remembrance Day.

"We had to contend with bucketing rain and the chaotic roads of Asia in the monsoon season, almost being beheaded by a front-end loader on Route 1 in Vietnam, and sliding under an out-of-control gravel truck in heavy mud down near Vinh city," he said.

"But the toughest test has been the Nullarbor because of its sheer remoteness and the unusually bad weather we encountered there and in the West Australian wheat belt where we were whipped by 85 knot winds straight off the Antarctic."

Truck said while the first half of his ride was aimed at building a better understanding between Australia and our Asian neighbors, his Australian message was about raising awareness of PTSD injury and suicide - not just amongst veterans but serving soldiers and civilian emergency workers as well.

"The response has bowled me over, not just in the number of people who've heard about the ride but by how many are waving and tooting their horns or stopping us to pop a few bucks in the charity bucket. We're supporting three leading PTSD charities and almost everyone from truck drivers to grey nomads, farmers and ordinary townsfolk are coming forward with donations."
