## Adelaide Serves up Civic Welcome for ex-SAS Amputee on 10,000km Charity Ride to Support Injured Veterans

One-legged Vietnam veteran Laurie 'Truck' Sams will receive a civic reception when he pedals into Adelaide later this month on a six-month, 10,000km bike ride to raise awareness for veteran suicide and post-traumatic stress disorder.

The 67-year-old former Special Air Service warrant officer, who lost his left leg below the knee in a parachute accident in 1995, has battled unseasonably cold head winds after leaving Perth to cross the Nullarbor on September 5.

"In the first week we were hit by 82-knot gales straight off the Antarctic and it became a case of pedal for two hours and thaw out in the sleeping bag for the next hour to avoid hypothermia," the veteran adventurer said from Eucla today.

Truck was awarded a Star of Courage for saving the life of his student parachutist in the accident that cost him his left leg.

He will receive an official welcome to Adelaide at the Torrens Parade Ground by Deputy Lord Mayor Megan Hender and RSLSA President Brigadier Tim Hanna at 11am on Saturday, October 15 before taking part in a wreath laying ceremony at the nearby Vietnam War Memorial.

RSLSA sub-branches or town councils at Port Augusta, Port Pirie, Clare, Two Wells, Murray Bridge and elsewhere along the ride route are staging welcome receptions, wreath layings and motorcycle, bike or police escorts for Truck and his support team in two brightly-logoed vehicles.

In Whyalla he will be joined for the leg to Adelaide by his son William, 27, who is flying in from New Zealand where he works as the head strength and conditioning coach at Christ's College in Christchurch and is a Lieutenant in the NZ Army Reserve.

"William was named after my father, who was captured in the fall of Singapore and went on to work on the Thai-Burma Death Railway until the end of the war," Truck said.

"He is doing this in remembrance of his grandfather and to support injured soldiers and vets, but he's a champion endurance athlete and I think he also wants to put his old man to the test as well."

A former Special Air Service Regiment Warrant Officer who lost his left leg below the knee in a parachute accident in 1995, Truck and his trusty Trek bike have logged 86 days and 7450km of riding since leaving Hanoi on May 12 carrying an Australian flag he wants to hand to the Prime Minister when he passes through Canberra on Remembrance Day.

"We've had to contend with bucketing rain, high winds, and the chaotic roads of Asia in the monsoon season, almost being beheaded by a front-end loader on Route 1 in Vietnam and sliding under an out-of-control gravel truck in heavy mud further south near Vinh city," he said.

"But the toughest test has been the Nullarbor because of its sheer remoteness and the unusually bad weather we've encountered here and earlier in the WA wheatbelt."

Truck said while the first half of his ride was aimed at building a better understanding between Australia and our Asian neighbors, the message in Australia was about raising awareness for PTSD injury and suicide - not just amongst veterans but serving soldiers and civilian emergency workers as well.

"I'm amazed at the response to this message and our donations bucket. The ride is supporting three leading PTSD charities and almost everyone from truck drivers to grey nomads, farmers and ordinary townsfolk are coming forward with donations."
